8 minutes, 46 seconds. That was how long George Floyd was face down on the ground, pinned down by the knee of Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin. Floyd was accused of buying cigarettes with a counterfeit \$20 bill. The police were called, and seventeen minutes after the first squad car arrived, Floyd was unconscious. He later died. This senseless act by now former police officer Derek Chauvin took the life of a man of color, who had a child and a life to live. He pleaded to be released so he could get in the cop car. He was literally willing to go in the car. That cry would be heard around the world. The recording of his arrest was shared widely on social media and has been witnessed by millions. None of the officers on the scene did anything to help Floyd. They treated Floyd as if he had killed someone, but he was only accused of counterfeiting. Chauvin has since been fired, arrested, and charged with 2nd degree murder. The other three officers have been arrested and charged as well. Rightfully so. Floyd's death was yet another incident of more innocent blood being spilled. In the aftermath, protests and riots have taken place across America. While trials now await those responsible for Floyd's death, America is once again fighting for equality and the lives of its people of color.

#### Fire and Fury: Armed Teachers? <sup>Opinion by</sup> Sebastian Germosen '20

Should teachers be armed with weapons? This is the question President Trump has sparked controversy about ever since the Parkland, Florida shooting. The shooting that left 17 dead has left Americans grieving and wondering why an act like that was committed.

The weekend following the shooting, Americans protested the NRA, lawmakers, and Trump, as they begged for changes in gun laws to avoid more school shootings and gun violence. People have heavily criticized the NRA for their lack of involvement or "engagement" in the conversation about changing gun laws, but President Trump has responded with his own idea of arming teachers with weapons in schools as a solution to prevent school shootings. As you might expect, the majority of Americans have expressed their anger and confusion as to why the President would make such an outlandish remark to try to fix the real problem with America. That problem is that our lawmakers and politicians are unwilling to make a change for the greater good of our country, as they continue to ignore the opinions of the majority of Americans and desire for change.

To make progress on Americans' desire for changes in gun laws, CNN hosted a town hall which would become a historic exchange between survivors of a horrific school shooting and America's elected leaders. Students, parents, and faculty of Marjory Stoneman Douglas attended this event, as they questioned the leaders and told them that change must happen. Those leaders included Florida's two US senators, Republican Marco Rubio, Democrat Bill Nelson, Congressman Ted Deutch, road County Sheriff Scott Israel and a spokesperson for the NRA. Before the event begins, it was announced that President Trump declined to attend the event in person or from the White House. Many believed this showed an unqualified President showing his carelessness for his own people and another problem that America faces, which is a President with no intention of making anything "great again." To begin the Town Hall, Ted Deutch stated

that it is too late for talks of getting weapons of war out of communities and also told Senator Nelson that "the folks in our community don't want words, they don't want thoughts and prayers, they want action and we owe it to them." The evening would continue with questions surrounding the topic of gun policy, thoughts and prayers for those who were killed, and a group of politicians who promise to try to make change happen, but they probably won't. In relation to the debacle of arming teachers, I recently interviewed Br. Patrick McNamara, the US Provincial of the Marist Brothers, who is serving his 3rd non-consecutive term in that position. He recently made a tweet, expressing his disapproval of the idea of giving teachers a weapon in schools. He stated, "Give teachers guns? Really? Now that's not compassionate listening. No guns for Marist teachers in our schools. Not now not ever!!!!" I asked him a few questions regarding his tweet, President Trump, and his beliefs on a new gun policy. My first question pertained to Trump's presidency so far. He stated, "In his first year, the President seems to maintain a very chaotic office and often has not addressed and been sensitive to issues that are Catholic centered. So, I'm feeling disappointed." His response raises a valid point about our President, due to his decisions on not focusing on religious or domestic problems, but only on economic problems.

When asked why he made the tweet, Br. Patrick stated, "When I watched the 'listening session' of the President with the students from Parkland, I was stunned that his first response was about arming teachers. Immediately,

I tweeted to my Marist family and friends. I was stunned with the raw emotions those parents and students shared with the President, and truly, they only wanted to be listened to, he could only respond with guns. He had no real feeling about the pain these folks, and the nation is enduring about gun violence."

I think many Americans, not all, would agree with Br. Patrick and were thinking the same thing when they saw the President talking and "listening" to the Parkland survivors. It was an utter disgrace that instead of introducing a solution for school safety and a plan to prevent school shootings, President Trump can only think of giving teachers what has caused this problem,.

Due to his position as US Provincial, my third question asked him if sees any changes in gun policy taking place in the near future. He stated, "A State Representative from our Marist school in Florida called me to assure me that their Governor was interested in changing gun laws especially in concern to greater school safety. I hope so. As a result of all that has happened in our nation, I support competent, trained, professional security personnel at our schools to protect our students.

However, I do not support arming teachers, staff, administrators. As professionals, their job is to educate and care for students."

When asked if he would ever change his decision of arming teachers due to any circumstances, such as a law making it mandatory, he was firm in saying: "I do not believe a law will ever be passed that schools must arm teachers. I repeat, no guns for Marist teachers in our schools." With his responses, Br. Patrick has given me insight into what the future holds for us: hope that local politicians can step up and fix the problem Americans are facing that the White House can't, which is making change happen.

## Death of Jamal Khashoggi Leaves Many Questions

The death of journalist Jamal Khashoggi has been the most talked about topic in the news recently as his death has been questioned by many. Jamal Khashoggi was a Saudi Arabian journalist, author, and a former general manager and editor-in-chief of Al-Arab News Channel. He served as editor for the Saudi Arabian newspaper Al Watan, transforming it into a platform for Saudi Arabian progressives and to give those oppressed in Saudi Arabia a voice against that oppression. He covered major stories including the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and the rise of Osama Bin Laden for various Saudi news organizations. For decades, he was closely associated with the Saudi royal family and also served as an adviser to the government, but fell out of favor and went into self-imposed exile in the US last year. From there, he wrote a monthly column in the Washington Post in which he criticized the policies of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, which some believed led to his inevitable death.

Khashoggi first visited the Saudi Arabia consulate in Istanbul to obtain a document certifying that he had divorced his ex-wife, so that he could marry his Turkish fiancée. He was told he would have to return and arranged to come back on October 2. Khashoggi's fiancée waited for more than 10 hours outside the consulate and returned the following morning when Khashoggi had still not reappeared. As his disappearance was reported and his body had not been recovered, people around the world believed that he had died inside that consulate. Security footage showed a man who looked like Khashoggi, with the same clothes and facial hair, exiting the consulate but would be proven as a body-double.

As the investigation into Khashoggi's disappearance progressed, President Trump demanded to know what happened in the death of Jamal Khashoggi, but also voiced a "protective view" of the U.S.-Saudi alliance, a perspective also expressed by two of his top aides. Many questioned Trump's view because of what had happened to Khashoggi, but his view is realistic because of the United States' close relationship with Saudi Arabia. US lawmakers, including allies of President Trump, have called for the president to part ways with Saudi Arabia in the alliance, and for Saudi Arabia to be punished, but Trump and members of his administration continue to ally with Saudi Arabia due to the risk of jeopardizing billions of Saudi dollars flowing into the US economy via weapons purchases and investments. "Many Americans have found it unsettling to watch as the Trump administration allows Saudi Arabia — especially Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, the country's de facto leader, who likely ordered the hit —to sweep the affair under the rug."—Vox.

Turkey initiated its own investigation into the disappearance of Khashoggi and have discovered that Khashoggi was in fact killed in the consulate. As this investigation concluded and the world demanded answers, Saudi Arabia confirmed the death of Khashoggi but say that he died in a fight. Many believed this to be unlikely, but President Trump thought that this explanation was "credible." As the US intelligence agencies told Trump that this explanation was fabricated and not likely, Trump would add that Khashoggi's death is "unacceptable." Many thought if Khashoggi really did die in a fight, then where is the body, but Saudi Arabia failed to produce an answer. Many believed the murder was premeditated and ordered by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman due to Khashoggi's history of criticizing the Saudi government and its policies.

On October 23, President Trump ramped up his rhetoric against Saudi Arabia over the death of Khashoggi, as the U.S. took its first steps to punish the kingdom over the incident that has triggered global outrage. Speaking to reporters at the White House, Trump criticized the operation that led to the journalist's death as the "worst cover-up ever" and said whoever is responsible "should be in big trouble." This response of the situation contradicts his original statement of keeping the alliance with

Saudi Arabia, due to his intent of not jeopardizing the countries' relationship, but also suggests that he will punish those truly responsible. Then, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo announced that the U.S. is revoking visas for some Saudi officials allegedly responsible for Khashoggi's death. He said the U.S. is also weighing sanctions designed to target humanrights violators, a step that was requested by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee." These penalties will not be the last word on this matter from the United States," said Pompeo. "We're making very clear that the United States does not tolerate this kind of ruthless action to silence Mr. Khashoggi, a journalist, through violence." These actions by United States' leaders could prove detrimental in the future due to our beneficial relationship with one Saudi Arabia.

As Khashoggi's death remains a mystery, the questions comes of what truly led to his death and who ordered it. Khashoggi's last column in the Washington Post was about freedom of expression in the Arab world, as he informs us about the things in the Arab world that need to be fixed and things that can improve in the future. He states the corruptness of the government and says what he feels about what's going on in the government.

Khashoggi's death also brings a question about the violence directed toward journalists. According to UNESCO, over 1,000 journalists have been killed since 2006 and the latest killing of Khashoggi has proven that violence occurring against journalists is one of the problems this world faces. Journalists have been "a part of the battlefield," but are now being specifically targeted with violence. Violence towards journalists has also been a major problem in the Middle East, as "the targeting of Palestinian journalists by Israeli forces continues unabated"— TheNewArab. As Khashoggi's death becomes reveled to the world, violence towards journalists will either face more scrutiny in the global community or worsen.

## The Virus Heard Around the World

The United States has reported more cases and deaths than China, the origin of the virus, and "the worst is yet to come." With more than 71,000 deaths and thousands more infected, the virus' impact on the US has reached every state, and the number of cases continues to grow. Citizens have been touched by its affects, as some have been infected, loved ones have been lost, or their daily lives have been dramatically altered. All sports leagues and events have been cancelled/postponed, quarantines and lockdowns have prevented people from leaving their homes, and social distancing has greatly limited gatherings of all sizes. High school and university campuses across the country have been closed as distance learning has become the primary method of learning for schools now. Nonessential businesses have closed,

while the US economy has capsized and is plunging into uncharted territory. Millions of Americans have filed for unemployment and that number will become even greater as we slowly creep closer to numbers seen during the Great Depression.

As the effects of the virus have been seen throughout the country, New York State has been hit the hardest. With over 321,000 confirmed cases and more than 25,000 deaths, New York has experienced hell in the past two months. Governor Andrew Cuomo and Mayor Bill De Blasio have spoken in press conferences daily, updating New Yorkers with new information and shedding light on the situation. Hospitals were at first "overwhelmed" with the number of people infected with the virus, as medical supplies became scarce and nurses and doctors have worked tirelessly while risking their lives to save those inflicted with the virus. According to Governor Cuomo, the "apex has been reached" in New York State, but efforts to fight the virus must continue.

Governor Cuomo later pushed NY Pause to at least May 15th.

"Jerusalem is a festival and a lamentation. Its song is a sigh across the ages, a delicate, robust, mournful psalm at the great junction of spiritual cultures." (David K. Shipler) Jerusalem has been one of the most conflicted lands in the world, as both Israelis and Palestinians have fought countless wars over its control. Ever since the 1948 Arab-Israeli War and previous conflicts, Jerusalem was only considered a battleground between armies and religions of two different peoples. Numerous attempts to stop the conflicts and establish peace have been missteps in how the world can resolve a historical battle, such as a 1980 law that unsuccessfully declared Jerusalem to be recognized Israel's "undivided" capital. Ever since this law was passed, but failed to work, no one expected any US President to be able to recognize Israel as its capital, until now. On December 6, 2017, President Trump made a decision that will affect the world and change people's perspectives on foreign affairs. He had declared that the US will recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital and he will move the US embassy there from Tel Aviv. The US has been a primary mediator between Israelis and Palestinians, but it now takes a controversial step towards what the President calls "a recognition of reality." During his speech, Trump said his decision is "a new approach to peace between Israelis and Palestinians" and says "that past Presidents have failed to do what he has done today."

Trump's decision has received massive backlash, as numerous countries and world leaders have expressed disapproval and "vengeance" towards

Trump. Protests erupted around the world, as civilians in Pakistan, Lebanon, Indonesia, Arab nations and Palestinians have committed violent acts to express their disgust of Trump's decision, while Germany, France, and North Korea have criticized Trump. According to The New York Times, terrorist organizations, such as the Taliban, Hamas, and Shia have vowed bloodshed, while ISIS has criticized those organizations. Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas, who says that Trump's actions were a "slap in the face" to Palestinians have disagreed with Trump's statements, saying it is "a step towards catastrophic results." Saeb Erekat, the general secretary of the Palestinian Liberation Organization, stated that the move would "promote international anarchy and disrespect for global institutions and law." Along with numerous foreign disapprovals, domestic outrage has also been shown as the UN voted overwhelmingly to condemn Trump's decision. Nikki Haley, US ambassador to the UN, threatened to stop funding the world body if Trump's decision was condemned. During a Christmas Day speech, Pope Francis rebuked Trump's decision, calling for a two-state solution to end the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Weeks after Trump's decision, Pope Francis criticized the decision stating that Jerusalem is sacred to Jews, Christians and Muslims and called for its identity to remain unchanged. In addition to these massive protests and criticisms to Trump's decision, there are some who believe that this is a very smart and "presidential move." Israeli President Reuven Rivlin called Trump's decision "a landmark in the recognition of the right of the Jewish people to our land, and a milestone on our road to peace—peace for all residents of Jerusalem, and the whole region." Guatemala, Honduras, Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Palau, and Togo also supported Trump's decision, as the US has provided great resources for these countries.

Many have dubbed this event the "Kiss of Death," due to its effect in the two-state solution of finding a negotiable peace coexistence between the two states. Many have questioned why the US President would make such a controversial decision that will affect the conflicts between Palestinians and Israelis and how it will ultimately end the peace process instead of achieving it. As the new year goes on, many will have doubts about this decision and how the world will look at it, but for now, peace in the Middle East has not been sustained. 2017 was a year of controversy in politics, that defined what type of nation we are and how the remainder of Trump's presidency can greatly effect the world as we know it.
